Tustin

As you may already know from either our website or flyer, the Tustin Area Historical Society is pleased to announce a new Arcadia Publishers book written by Guy Ball.

The Arcadia series is known for its photo-laden series of paperback books showcasing hundreds of towns across the country, written by local historians in cooperation with local museums.

Arcadia Publishers has an exhaustive set of criteria for their series, and while many towns around us already have these books in print, we hadn't found anyone anxious to tackle one for Tustin. We were thrilled when Guy offered to research and pull together this book, as we couldn't think of anyone more suitable. As the author of *Vintage Postcards of Santa Ana*, and co-author of *Early Santa Ana* (both published by Arcadia), he was already well acquainted with Arcadia's format. As a long-time resident of Tustin, TAHS member, and webmaster for our TAHS website, he was certainly familiar with our history.

Guy and his wife fell in love with Tustin while enjoying one of our home tours many years ago, and he finds the

feel of the community to be much like the small town in New Jersey where he was raised. A senior technical writer for an Irvine company, he says he enjoys using his skills to bring the history of small towns to life, although with his career, his wife, and two boys in high school, it's hard to imagine where he finds time for these projects. History is obviously his passion, though, as along with his Arcadia books, he's heavily involved in the Orange County Historical Society, and helped edit and design a series of books for the Santa Ana Historical Preservation Society. He was the recipient of that Society's 2010 Preservation Award, their highest annual award.

If you missed the Book Signing on February 5th at the Museum, you'll have another opportunity during our spring Promenade on May 14th to meet Guy and buy a personalized copy of the book. If you already own a copy, bring it with you to the Promenade where he'll be happy to sign it for you.



HENRY LOMAKIN, A GOOD AMERICAN BOY

Since we're carrying an article about the Tustin Food Center Reunion in this issue, it reminded us that the owner of the store, Ed Cox, ran a weekly column in The Tustin News in the 1950s, filled with the week's activities, commentary, and considerable opinion. In a conversation at the Museum with our new president, Bill Teter, about last fall's Tustin High School Reunion, the name of Henry Lomakin came up. Henry's story was something that would have appealed to Ed Cox to include in one of his articles – as perhaps he did, but we don't have ready access to all of them. It did appear in the December 20, 1956 Tustin News. It's a nice American story.

Henry Lomakin was born in Rostov, Russia in 1937. From there, he fled with his family to Germany, then immigrated to Orange County, sponsored by the First Baptist Church of Santa Ana. He attended Tustin schools from the 8th grade on and was looking forward to entering the Army in February, 1957, when he turned 18. The reason for the The Tustin News story was that Henry, a TUHS senior, had just passed his exams to become an American citizen, and the school was anxious to point to him as an excellent example of American youth. Although language was still a struggle for him, he was liked by everyone. He managed the high school's varsity football team, and worked in the school's cafeteria for extra money. When asked why he came to the United States, Henry replied, "I had to have a country, and I had to have the United States". He was impressed by the freedom here and said he thought "the U.S. was the greatest place in the world". Ed Cox would have loved that.

Henry had planned to attend the 2010 TUSD reunion last fall and Bill Teter, along with many others, was looking forward to seeing him again. Sadly, he was involved in an accident aboard his boat only a couple of days before the reunion, and passed away the day after it. He was missed.

TUSTIN FOOD CENTER REUNION

A town without a grocery store is scarcely a town at all. Over its history, Tustin has been home to several independent groceries, beginning in 1874 when Lysander Utt acquired a two-story building on the southwest corner of Main and "D" Streets and opened the L. Utt Pioneer Store on its first floor. That was soon followed by Columbus Tustin's store and Post Office, just north below "C" Street. Shortly following both of those were Carter's Grocery on "D" Street between Main and 3rd (see photo), and the Mercantile Store (now Rutabegorz Restaurant). While none in Tustin can remember any of these stores, almost all the "old timers" in town will remember the Tustin Food Center at the southeast corner of Main and "D", owned and operated by Ed and Leola Cox. Tustin Food Center supplied most of Tustin and its outlying farm lands with canned goods, fresh fruits and vegetables, and freshly cut meat from its meat counter, and provided a place to catch up with the local gossip.



Ed and Leola's son, Phil, is planning a celebration on March 27, 2011 to honor the Food Center's 75th anniversary. He continues to own the store site and building now known as Cox's Market Plaza, home to several businesses, and is also responsible for the historical site signs on buildings around town.
